Aquatic biosecurity awareness – what's it all about?

The first in a series of six Northern Australia Aquatic Biosecurity Awareness workshops kick off in Darwin on Wednesday 18 April.

The workshops offer biosecurity awareness training including: prevention; early detection of disease; control measures to prevent spread; and eradication.

The workshops are facilitated by Dr Matt Landos, Director of Future Fisheries Veterinary Service (FFVS), who says the workshops offer aquatic producers practical tools to protect their livelihoods from pests and diseases.

"Northern Australia is a vast gateway from all corners of Australia as well as our north, so it's critical we maintain strong biosecurity practices to keep our industries safe and sustainable for future generations," said Dr Landos.

"Biosecurity is a term that's been around for a long time, but its importance has become more evident to the aquatic industry with aquatic outbreaks occurring in Australia over the past few years.

"These workshops will assist participants in securing their farms profitability and enabling greater access to new markets through superior biosecurity assurance."

The workshops have been developed as a collaborative effort between Animal Health Australia, Department of Agriculture and Water Resources and FFVS.
